


Science news

Investigating ramps of differing slope and an object mass on the average speed

After learning physics theories in relation to speed, velocity and acceleration, year 10 students worked in pairs to investigate the effect of differing ramp slope and varying mass of an object on the average speed. They actively made their own hypothesis in terms of the height of the ramp and the mass of the object relating to the average speed produced. Students measured the total length of the ramp, the height raised by the adjustable lever as well as the angle formed by the ramp and the bench.

After collating all the data into the provided table, they calculated the average speed for each height manipulated and compared their result with other groups in their class. Students then discussed their findings in the group and produced a written or oral reflection on assumptions they made, the limitations of their experiment, reasonableness of their findings as well as their recommendations for further research.





Year 10 Traffic Survey

Year 10 science students worked collaboratively in pairs participating in a Traffic Survey investigation on Monday morning, week 6. Students planned an individual average speed investigation and surveyed 30 cars that passed in front of the school oval, on Daws Road. The results obtained from their survey indicated that all of the cars investigated travelled at an average speed of under 25 km/h (approximately 6.94m/s). Students communicated their findings in their scientific practical report and also discussed the implications of their findings discussing fines for speeding drivers contributing to this situation. They also indicated that their presence on the kerb was the likely reason for the results and that most motorists are conscious of the strict road rules in a school zone. Students also explored improvements in relation to the method they utilised in this survey in order to obtain more detailed findings.

Stage 2 Earth and Environmental Science

A number of our year 12 students have been studying this course which has seen them investigate Earth Systems, Earth's resources, Earth's sustainable future and Climate Change. A HUGE part of the subject is the Earth System Study which counts for a massive 30% of the students' final grade (it is instead of an exam).

Whilst COVID has made the fieldwork aspect of this course incredibly difficult we have managed in the last part of this term to get out into the field and spend a significant amount of time at the Oaklands Wetlands.

During our first visit, early this term, we met with the Flinders University STEM outreach team; Peter Reeve and Dr Ngai Ning Cheng. These water experts took us on a tour discussing not just the wetlands and their purpose but how the wetlands fits within the bigger picture of the water cycle here on the Adelaide Plains and out into the gulf. Our students collected water samples along the route and then completed a number of tests back in the lab. Students tested for nutrients such as nitrates and phosphates and also harmful bacteria in the water samples they collected.



This experience was the starting point for students to develop their own Earth System Study. Each of the students has designed a process to test their own individual hypothesis about how the presence of reeds (part of the Biosphere) impact on the water quality in a particular way (the Hydrosphere). The aspects of water quality being studied include – pH, nitrate levels and phosphate levels. The students are also observing and recording other significant contributors to water quality such as weather (in particular rainfall), water levels and visible water attributes such as water clarity and biological determinants, in particular water birds. There are many birds on and around the wetlands including ducks, Moorhens, Coots, Swamphens, Ibis and even a Pelican or two. In fact up to 45 different species of birds have been observed in the wetlands.

The students have just finished, this week, their observations and data collection. They have data from across 5 weeks they need to collate and analyse to determine if their original hypothesis is supported or not. Their final product will be a 2000 word report which I will mark and then submit to the SACE board for moderation and final grade determination. GO year 12's!!



A special mention goes to Christopher who is studying alongside this group but doing year 11 Chemistry. He has been with us for our field work and has been conducting his own Environmental Chemistry testing which will be a part of his assessment folio in this subject.

Last but not least thanks to David Moore who has supported our class on these trips. He has been documenting the students work in short films and photos and will be using this to create a wonderful virtual tool called a Storysphere which will be accessible on our website and other media platforms when it is complete. Stay tuned.....
