Dear parents and carers

Thank you for supporting your child and the school through the recent Student Led Conferences and subject preference selection processes for senior students. We were pleased to be able to review the achievement against the previous goals set by students and plan for even more success in the remainder of the year.

The first round of identifying subject preferences for 2023 enables the development of the timetable and the next round of course selection for students in years 10-12 in 2023. There is still an opportunity to complete initial subject preferences if that is not yet done.

I am grateful for the work of the care group teachers and the leaders who assisted in the processes of Student Led Conferences.

This week the pupil free day will occur on Friday 2 September and staff will work with some advisors and support from the Brightpath team who will assist Springbank to further develop and improve student writing skills in the middle years. Planning for more interdisciplinary learning programs (such as Science Technology Engineering Arts Mathematics) will be supported across the day. Monday 5 September is our **school closure day** and is timed to coincide with the Royal Adelaide Show.

I have prepared an update report of the progress of the refurbishment of the northern and central wings of the school as well as some information about the construction of the Covered Outdoor Learning Area (COLA) and landscaping. We are looking forward to the completion of this work and opportunity to enjoy the stunning new facilities.

In April this year, I informed the community that through Governing Council, we were exploring the possibility of securing a loan from the Department for Education to ensure that Phase 2 (the science wing) of the Capital Works and refurbishment program could go ahead. With the support of the finance services, it was determined that the loan was not appropriate for the school and the repayment commitment was too great for this small school.

Governing Council agreed to seek a meeting with the Minister for Education (Hon. Blair Boyer MP) and the Chief Executive (Mr Martin Westwell) to request funding the important final phase of the Capital Works thus bringing the science facilities into the 21st century and provide flexible, high quality learning spaces for all the school's students. We are currently waiting for confirmation of that meeting date later this term and we look forward to a positive outcome of the discussions.

HASS

This term, our year 9 HASS class has been studying WW1. Through our study of WW1 our class has explored the causes, battles and technology of WW1. Students practiced key skills of historical enquiry and presented their learning through round table discussions and creating information texts.

More recently, students explored the experiences of a particular soldier during WW1. Students were asked to interview a family member or a trusted adult to gain an understanding of the life of a particular solider during WW1. Some students interviewed family members while others interviewed teachers and other adults in their lives. Fred is commended for interviewing family members and then researching the lives of all the men in his family alive during WW1. Joanna, Declan, Martina and Caiden also did well to interview staff to successfully complete the task. Students engaged with this task and developed a sincerer understanding and connection to the soldiers of WW1, "It was very sad and tragic to learn their stories." ~ Martina

With a deeper understanding of the devastation of war our class is now moving on to study the role and contribution of Australian women and Indigenous Australians during WW1 before we explore the peace treaties that ended WW1.

Year 9 Science Excursion to Urrbrae Wetlands



Year 9 students recently visited the wetlands at Urrbrae. As part of their biological science curriculum, students had the opportunity to explore the wetland habitat and investigate the range of plants and animal life that this unique environment allows.



With the support of Vanessa Greenslade, the manager of the Wetlands, the students collected water samples from the four ponds around the site. Each sample was measured for oxygen levels, temperature, turbidity and pH. Using their results, students were able to assess whether the Urrbrae

Wetland does help to clean up the storm water from the local area, including the roads surrounding the Wetland, before it runs out to the sea. Students observed that the oxygen and temperature increased as the water moved

through the ponds while salinity, turbidity and pH decreased. Students questioned the reason why these abiotic factors changed for the good and concluded that the water reeds filtered out many of the impurities to provide



cleaner water as it transitioned from one pond to the next.



Again, after collecting new samples of pond water, students could identify Dragonfly larvae, Water fleas, Pouch snails and Water boatmen to name a Working in teams, students investigated macroinvertebrates that live in the water.



few. Using the microscopes, students could take photographs of the aquatic animals and make qualitative and quantitative observations of the animals that they had caught.

This excursion allowed the students to apply the knowledge gained in the classroom to an authentic location in nature.

Construction and Refurbishment



The refurbishment of the northern and central wings of the main build at Springbank is really taking shape. We now have a better idea of the dimensions and layout of the learning areas and interdisciplinary spaces. The addition of extra doorways and windows has created light filled rooms and flexible learning spaces.



The builder's hoardings that close off the building site from walkways and access make excellent blank canvasses for artworks and murals. This collaborative art piece near the central stairwell highlights a theme of our pastoral care program – **BE KIND!**



The clever and flexible design of the learning areas will allow us to have large open spaces for meetings and events or close (or even partially close) the operable walls to create individual class-sized learning spaces.

This image of the new art space on the ground floor of the central wing will have access directly to the outdoor learning areas through the addition of doorways and windows which overlook the landscape gardens of the courtyard.



Upstairs classrooms include break out/ small group work spaces within the learning space, cleverly maintaining student connection to the rest of the class.

Online blackmail and sexual extortion response kit

This kit has been created to help you manage serious incidents of online blackmail involving sexual extortion.

While online blackmail and sexual extortion can take various forms, this resource is specific to a global trend of teenage boys being targeted on social media in exchange for money.

WHAT IS IT?

Online blackmail involving sexual extortion is when someone is pressured or tricked into taking and sending sexual content of themselves online.

An offender then threatens to on-share your content to others unless their demands are met. These demands include:

- More images/videos
- · Sexual favours
- Money

Authorities globally are seeing a significant increase in offenders overseas targeting teenagers with threats to share their content in exchange for money, gift cards or online gaming credits.

If this happens to you and you are under the age of 18, it is online child sexual abuse.

HOW IT WORKS

Offenders create a fake profile, identify as a female, and send a direct message on social media.

The fake profile will then suggest that the chat continues onto another platform, usually one where you can do video calls, or where images and videos can be sent

The chat will turn sexual, and the fake profile will convince you to participate in sexualised video calls or send images or videos of yourself. During video calls this content is recorded without you knowing.

Once the 'female' profile has your content, they will ask you for a large amount of money otherwise they will threaten to share it with your friends and family from your social media contacts. They might ask for cryptocurrency, online bank transfer, or online game or gift cards.

Once you have paid them, they will continue to ask you for money and threaten to share your content.

HOW TO GET SUPPORT

You don't have to manage this alone; what has happened is not your fault. There are many ways you can get help to talk about what has happened to you.

- Speak to someone you trust for advice such as a friend, parent, carer, teacher or school counsellor. There is nothing so bad you can't tell a trusted adult.
- If a sibling or friend comes to you, there are various support services available, and you can report on their behalf.
- <u>Kids Helpline</u> is a free and confidential 24-hour online phone counselling service for young people aged 5-25 years and even parents. You can call them or chat to them online.

If you, or someone you know, has been sent sexualised content of someone on your social media friends list

- Tell your friend that someone has on-shared their content with you, and remind them that there are things that can be done to fix it.
- · Support your friend and have their back.
- Encourage your friend to talk to a trusted adult, or talk to one on their behalf.
- Help your friend make a report to the Australian Centre to Counter Child Exploitation and to have any additional content removed by contacting the eSafety Commissioner.
- Delete the content. This is considered to be child abuse material and there are offences for saving, storing or on sharing this content further.

HOW TO DEAL WITH IT

These offenders will make you feel like you will be in trouble for what has happened to keep the crime going. It is important to know that you've done nothing wrong.

You can make it stop



Avoid sending any more images or videos.



Do not pay. Once you pay the first time, they will ask you to pay again.



Immediately take screenshots from the chat, this will be important for making a report to the police.



MAKING A REPORT

If you are under the age of 18 and this situation has happened to you (or another young person you know), you are a victim of online child sexual abuse which must be reported to police.

While you may be embarrassed to talk about, it is important to get help as soon as possible. Your safety and wellbeing are the most important things. Remember that the police are here to protect you. They are on your side.



- Screenshots of the chat
- · URLs
- Any other records that you can get from the profile
- This might include the profile name, profile picture, or any other contact information
- Make an online report to the Australian Centre to Counter Child Exploitation.

Don't send images or videos of yourself as part of the report, this is child abuse material.

If you think you are in immediate danger, call Triple Zero (000).

What to expect after making a report to the Australian Centre to Counter Child Exploitation

- Your report to the Australian Centre to Counter Child Exploitation will be looked at by specialist investigators in the Australian Federal Police.
- After your report has been assessed, the police will be in contact via email or phone to talk about what has happened and to make sure that you are safe.
- Police are here to protect children from online child sexual abuse, so it's important to know that you won't be criticised, blamed or arrested for being a victim.
- It is normal to want to hide what has happened and not talk about it with your parents, carers or police. Offenders use this fear to continue to commit crimes against you and other victims. The best protection you have is to get specialist support as soon as possible.

GETTING YOUR CONTENT REMOVED IF IT HAS BEEN POSTED ONLINE

If you find sexualised content of yourself has been posted online, there are things you can do to have it taken down.

The eSafety Commissioner prioritises the removal of child sexual abuse material and can help you.
